EPFSUG was launched in February 2011 and has grown to having 5 MEPs as **Patrons**, 14 people working in the EP have joined as **Members**, and we have 50 **Supporters**.

## Free software and the EP need each other

Free software can help the EP to ensure that all its activities are conducted with the utmost transparency. With free software, the EP can examine what the software does, perform independent security audits, and make sure all documents, procedures and multimedia files are available in formats that can be supported by any software anywhere.

Free software would also free the EP from vendor lock-in. The EP's software could be supported, modified and developed internally. It could also be maintained and improved by any external company, including Europe's small- and medium-sized businesses. And by publishing its software as free software, the money EP spends on it becomes an investment for everyone.

Using free software inside the EP would probably also help when it comes to understanding laws about copyright, patents, IT procurement, open standards, and other topics touching computing and the internet.
